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Protecting and Empowering

The CCC Respite Home is open and operating, and offers children that have been on the streets shelter from the elements, protection from exploiters and empowers them with various training and tutoring provided at the centre daily. Mr Toyin Odugbemi has been coming weekly to teach them Tie and Dye, while Mr Desmond Awere comes to teach IT Literacy. Mrs Chinyere Udoekwere takes them twice weekly for English (Wednesdays) and Maths (Fridays). We appreciate all!

The children are first seen and interviewed by our support workers on the streets, and invited to the home for further assessments by our social workers weekly. When at the centre, they receive one to one counseling, participate in group counseling and competitions, and are supported on home tracing and visits by support and social workers. The eight children with us have received medical tests and necessary treatment. Their parents or guardians have been located, and most have visited the Home, some severally. We have the capacity to support twelve at a time, and are ready to receive referrals from other agencies, particularly for boys under 12 years old.

Hosting Old Friends

Tom, his grandmother and uncle, visited the Respite Home with plenty blessings in tow. They were pleased to see the centre, and encouraged the children to commit to the process of rehabilitation and reconciliation. Tom shared his story with the boys, and Mrs Smith prayed for them too. Fair Life Africa also hosted a gathering of friends, the Child Protection Network, inaugurated by UNICEF in Lagos. The monthly meeting was facilitated by **Barr. Taiwo Akinlami**, and enabled colleagues to discuss the wide ranging issues facing organizations supporting vulnerable children.

Advocacy Corner

The Child's Rights Acts 2003 Training organized by the Forum for the Forum held successfully on the 16th of April at the Staff Training Centre, **University of Lagos**. The Street Child Agenda

The Matron's Report

This report comes with smiles and tears, for the delights and the challenges of such a project. Looking after children is never easy, but several different children from different origins, and life experiences, who share the common anguish of having lived on the streets, is definitely a different ball game altogether. It has been a great learning experience for the team, as well as the boys. The first rule of the house, which has been tried and tested twice by one particular child is simple: *you are free to leave*. This presents a dilemma, but it is a true test of their commitment to the rehabilitation process. Faced with the disciplines of the home, children often runaway from rehabilitation homes, but when the door is *relatively* open, and the home conducive and caring, leaving is what is scary! Our 'No Fighting' rule and teaching on Conflict Resolution is also molding the boys to be gentler and less aggressive, which is their natural instinct, enhanced by street living. Each day we record progress, and our Good Behaviour Chart will soon be ripe for rewards. Tomorrow, they are looking forward to celebrating our first **Monthly Birthday Party** for April celebrants! We hope you'll celebrate with us soon \odot
